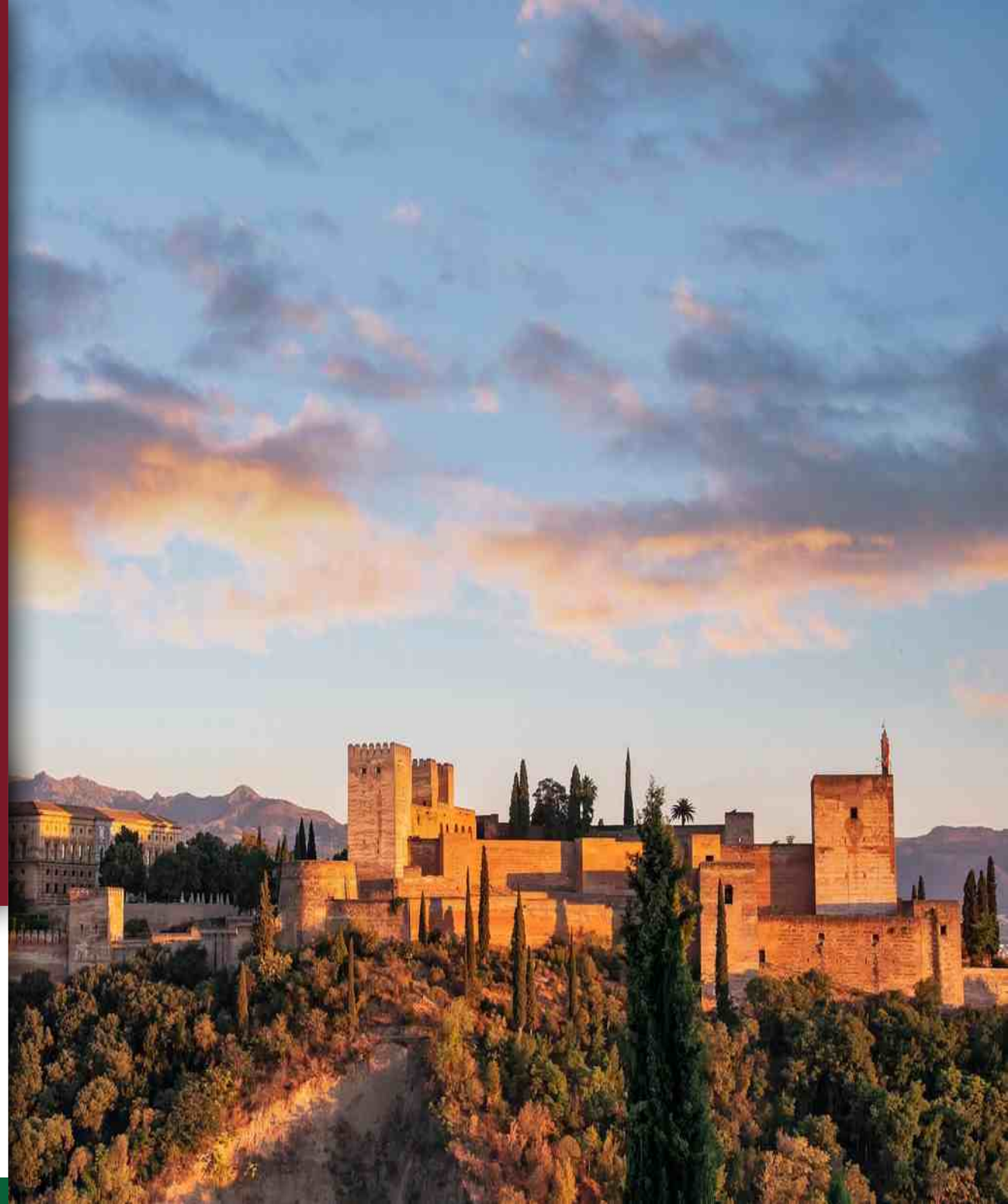

2. Lifestyle & Environment

2.1. From Digital Nomads to a Digital Migrants

The concept of a digital nomad encompasses multiple realities and nuances, often blurring the lines between the traditional expatriate, the itinerant professional, and the new technological migrant.

At Granada City Council, we place great importance on the digital aspect, seeing value in talented professionals who work online and remotely, and who may or may not strictly adhere to the itinerant lifestyle of a nomad.

We understand that while mobility is a right and a choice, our institutional vision transcends ephemeral stays in our city. We aspire for international talents to find their home here, and evolve into the figure of the digital migrant, as professionals who seamlessly integrate into the socio-economic and cultural fabric of our city.

This integration occurs organically, because Granada already possesses an intrinsically cosmopolitan identity, and highly international and open culture, partly thanks to the University of Granada, an institution that systematically welcomes among the highest numbers of European Erasmus and international students. This historical exchange has shaped an extraordinarily receptive society.

So, while the local infrastructure is perfectly suited to stays of a few months or recurring seasonal retreats, the true goal of the city is to retain your talent. We want you to stay long term and put down roots, whether settling permanently or returning seasonally, so that, with us, you will actively contribute your experience, vision and innovation to the sustained growth of Granada.





2.2. A Unique Geography from the Snow to the Sea

Granada boasts a unique geography that defines the local pace of life, and offers the perfect balance between work and well-being. Since the city is embraced by hills and mountains, it is therefore possible to put on your hiking boots right in the city centre, and then walk on out into breathtaking natural landscapes in a matter of minutes.

During the winter season, you have top tier facilities at the Sierra Nevada ski resort, whose peaks rise to over 3000 meters above sea level. In approximately one hour from the city centre, you can drive up there, park, and catch your first ski lift.

What's more, with a journey of just 45 minutes to the south, you can enjoy the subtropical climate of the Costa Tropical beaches. This astonishing topography makes Granada one of the few places in the world where it is possible to ski in the morning and swim in the sea in the afternoon, on the very same day.

This incredible landscape is bathed in more than 300 days, or nearly 3000 hours, of sunshine a year, that is, almost 70 percent of total possible daylight hours. Although weather stats indicate an average annual temperature of 15 degrees Celsius, or 60 60 degrees Fahrenheit, Granada experiences significant diurnal temperature shifts between day and night, often varying by as much as 15 to 20 degrees, or 27 to 36 degrees Fahrenheit.

This produces days that are usually very warm and bright, yet perfectly balanced by cool, refreshing mornings and evenings. This daily rhythm is ideal for the remote professional, as it allows you to exercise outdoors early in the day, work comfortably with clients in other time zones, and start the evening with a drink on one of the lively outdoor terraces of the city, guaranteeing an uninterrupted outdoor lifestyle.

2.3. Cultural and Sports Ecosystem

HERITAGE & MUSEUM NETWORK

Granada is the birthplace of universally acclaimed writers, artists and poets, such as Federico García Lorca, whose legacy continues to shape the streets and intellectual life of our city.

This immense cultural wealth is showcased across an extensive network of museums and exhibitions, and a carefully curated circuit of heritage sites managed directly by the Granada City Council.

CULTURAL & LEISURE AGENDA

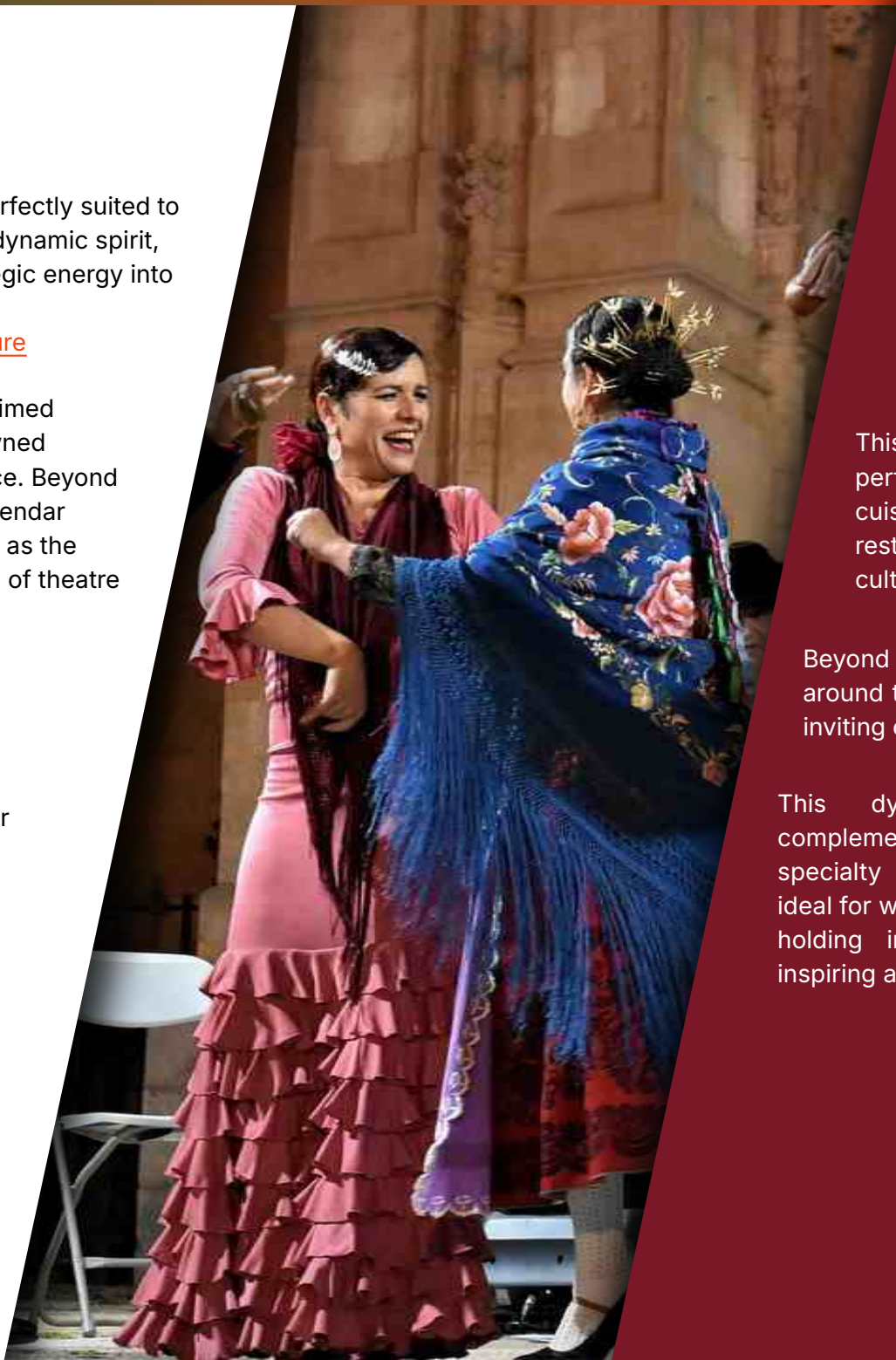

This cultural vitality thrives with top tier European networking infrastructures such as the [Science Park](#) and the Exhibition and Conference Centre, which serve as regular venues for major international technological summits.

Rounding out these diverse leisure options, cinema enthusiasts can also enjoy a wide selection of independent theatres with regular screenings of films in their original language.

Granada boasts a culinary scene deeply rooted in tradition and exceptional local ingredients, like olive oil, wine, and cured ham.

This authentic foundation coexists in perfect harmony with contemporary haute cuisine and Michelin recognised restaurants, elevating our legendary tapas culture to new heights.

Beyond the restaurants, daily life revolves around the bustling bars in historic squares and inviting outdoor terraces.

This dynamic environment is perfectly complemented by a growing array of sophisticated specialty coffee shops, creating modern spaces ideal for working comfortably with a laptop, and for holding informal meetings in a relaxed and inspiring atmosphere.

HISTORICAL TRADITIONS & FESTIVITIES

The local calendar is marked by historical celebrations that invite both residents and international visitors to experience our traditions in a truly immersive way.

Major festivities like Holy Week are known worldwide for the spectacular artistic displays of their processions through the historic neighbourhoods. Similarly, during the vibrant Day of the Cross, the city squares are beautifully adorned with imposing floral monuments, and filled with traditional music.

At the beginning of summer, the city goes all out for the Corpus Christi Fair. As the main celebration of Granada, it brings the local fairground to life with numerous festive tents and rides.

During this important week, the solemn religious processions of Corpus Christi coexist perfectly with the unique La Tarasca parade, a pagan counterpoint to the religious festivities.

Furthermore, local events like the pilgrimage of our patron Saint Cecilio, at the emblematic Sacromonte Abbey, offer an exceptional opportunity to connect with the authentic and welcoming identity of the city.





PHYSICAL WELL-BEING & SPORTS

When it comes to staying active and maintaining your physical well-being, the city provides top-tier sports facilities that blend seamlessly into the urban environment. Residents enjoy full access to the [Municipal Sports Network](#), featuring high performance sports centres, modern gyms, heated swimming pools, and paddle tennis courts.

If you prefer exercising outdoors, Granada offers skate parks, walking routes, and a beautiful system of hiking trails, which link the historic centre directly to the surrounding mountains, making it incredibly easy to keep up a healthy lifestyle.

2.4. Infrastructure, Mobility and Workspaces

The local infrastructure is designed to meet the most demanding technical requirements of global technological and executive talent, supported by a robust and constantly expanding network.





HIGH SPEED NETWORKS & TELECOMMUNICATIONS

At the telecommunications level the urban core of Granada has fiber optic coverage in next generation networks exceeding 95 percent supported by more than 1500 kilometers of wiring deployed in the capital and its metropolitan area.

Added to this is the widespread commercial deployment of 5G technology and the presence of local data centers and edge computing connection nodes. This powerful network infrastructure guarantees minimum latency and high availability which are critical aspects for software development and artificial intelligence projects driven by ecosystems like [iQuantum](#)

CO-WORKING & OFFICE ECOSYSTEM

Granada offers a wide variety of spaces specifically designed to meet the demands of remote professionals.

Digital workers can take advantage of an extensive network of modern [co-working centres](#) spread across the city. These hubs offer ultra-high speed connections, and fully equipped meeting rooms, alongside vibrant professional communities that are perfect for networking.

If you need more privacy or want to establish a corporate team here, Granada has numerous business centres providing flexible private offices and dedicated workspaces.

Furthermore, the highly creative climate of the city ensure you'll find inspiration working from public libraries, or the growing network of specialty coffee shops perfectly adapted for freelancers.





URBAN MOBILITY & GLOBAL CONNECTIONS

When it comes to global connectivity, the city offers exceptional travel options.

By air, the Federico García Lorca Granada Jaén Airport provides essential national flights, alongside direct international routes to major European capitals like Paris and Amsterdam.

For long-distance or transoceanic journeys, the Malaga Costa del Sol International Airport is only 90 minutes away by highway. As the fourth largest airport in Spain, it features direct flights to the United States and across Europe.

By land, Granada is seamlessly integrated into the national High Speed train network, bringing Madrid just over three hours away. Locally, a modern and highly efficient metro system smoothly connects peripheral residential neighbourhoods and large commercial districts directly to the heart of the city centre.

CONNECTIVITY IN HERITAGE AREAS

While the city is constantly working to upgrade the network across all its districts, we want to be completely transparent about the residential infrastructure.

In highly sought-after historic neighbourhoods designated as UNESCO World Heritage, such as the Albaycín and Sacromonte, connectivity can be limited by architectural constraints

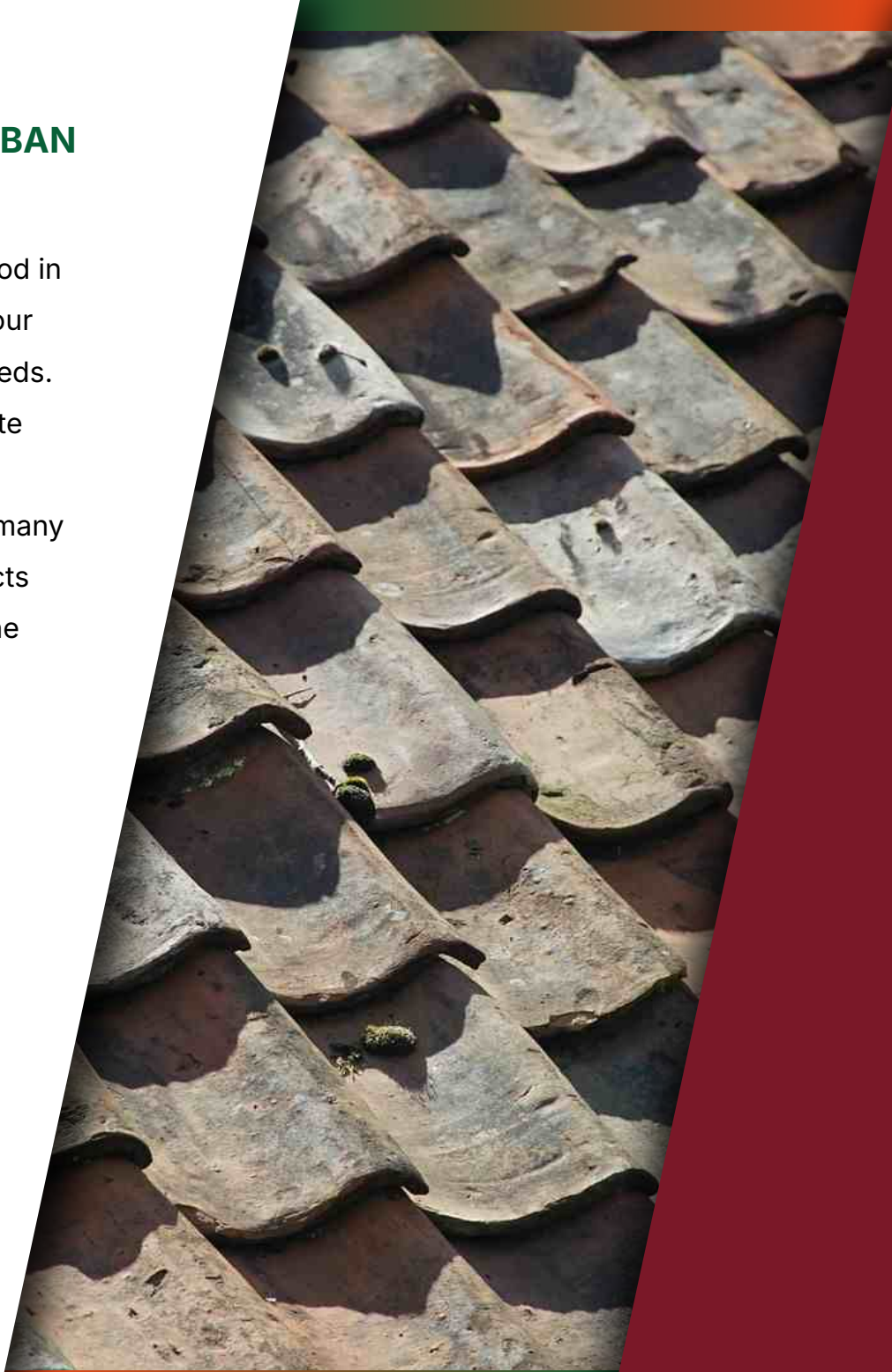
Therefore, we recommend verifying the exact internet set-up of your future home before signing the lease.



RESIDENTIAL AREAS & URBAN ENVIRONMENT

Finding your perfect neighbourhood in Granada depends on balancing your lifestyle with your professional needs. While the Albaycín and Sacromonte immerse you in history within a UNESCO World Heritage setting, many professionals prefer central districts like Centro Sagrario, Realejo, or the Magdalena neighbourhood.

These areas strike a beautiful balance between rich historical roots and modern urban living, offering exceptional connectivity alongside the convenience of having all services right at your doorstep.



If you are looking for more spacious apartments, better value, and lightning fast internet, you might consider districts perfectly linked by the metro network such as Ronda, Cervantes, Zaidín, or La Chana.

Neighbourhoods like Plaza de Toros and San Lázaro are also popular choices due to their energetic atmosphere, fantastic local food scene, and easy access to major transport hubs.



3. Legal and Administrative Landing

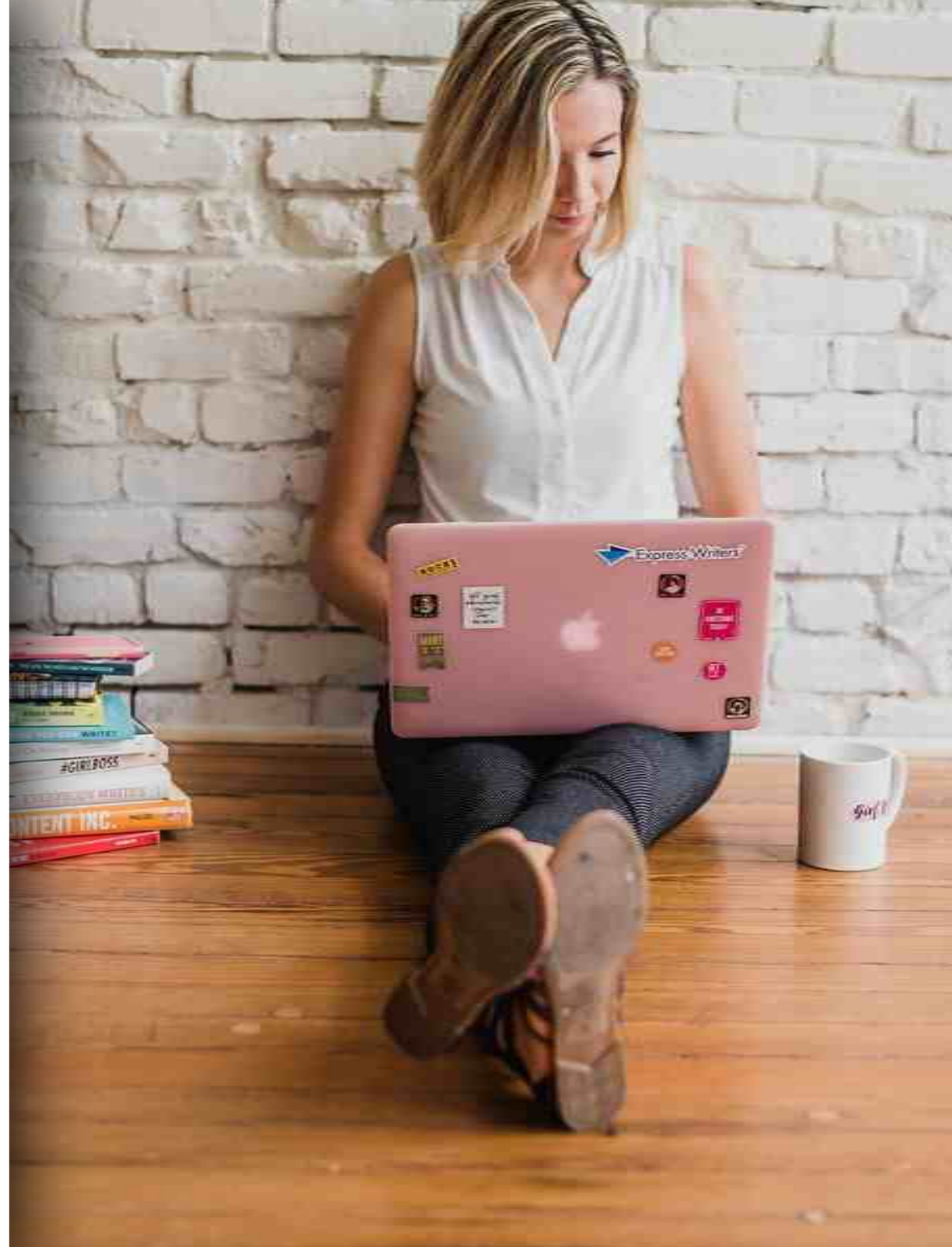
3.1. Understanding Your Profile

Since administrative requirements vary significantly between nationalities, identifying your legal status based on your passport is the first key step to getting to Granada and setting in.

EU, EEA & SWISS CITIZENS

Thanks to European free movement agreements, moving to Granada is straightforward, and depends primarily on how long you plan to stay.

- **Short stays or workations of less than 90 days:** You are in the easiest position possible. You do not need to deal with any bureaucracy, or apply for a foreigner identity number, or NIE. You can simply arrive in Granada and start working remotely from day one, while keeping your tax residency and employment ties in your home country.
- **Stays exceeding 3 months:** The main requirement is to join the Central Register of Foreign Nationals to receive your Registration Certificate and your foreigner identity number, or NIE. This process is handled by providing proof of being a freelancer or employee in Spain, or by demonstrating that you have enough funds to support yourself during your stay.



NON-EU CITIZENS

If your passport comes from a country outside the European area, such as the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Japan, South Korea, Singapore, or any Latin American country, you must obtain specific authorisation from the Directorate General of Migration to come and reside and work in Spain.

The **Digital Nomad Visa (DNV)** is the official and most advantageous pathway designed specifically to facilitate the relocation to Spain of digital workers.

3.2. The Digital Nomad Visa

Approved under the [Law for the Promotion of the Emerging Companies Ecosystem](#) or Start-up Law, this visa is the official route for international professionals and offers two main access routes.

THE CONSULAR ROUTE FROM YOUR COUNTRY

This pathway involves applying through the Spanish consulate in your current country of residence before your arrival. It provides an initial one year visa to enter Spain. Once this period ends, you will need to [renew it via the offices of the Spanish immigration authorities in Spain](#).

THE LARGE COMPANIES UNIT (UGE) TELEMATIC ROUTE FROM SPAIN

This option allows you to submit your application, via the [Large Companies Unit](#) (UGE), while you are already in Spain, provided you are staying legally under a short term permit or a Schengen visa exemption.

This is widely considered **the best route**, because it offers a fast track processing window of twenty business days and grants a residence permit **valid for three years** from the outset.





FINANCIAL & LABOUR REQUIREMENTS

To qualify, you need to provide evidence of an ongoing professional relationship lasting at least three months before your application. You must also show a steady monthly income that equals at least double the Spanish national minimum wage. If you plan on bringing family members, this required amount increases by specific percentages for each person.

SHORT STAYS & NON-EU SEASONAL NOMADS

If you only wish to stay in Granada for part of the year, such as the winter months, the legal framework is designed to support your flexibility. Even though the standard tourist exemption allows stays under 90 days, you still need a Digital Nomad Visa to work legally.

A significant benefit of this visa is that the one year or three year periods represent a maximum allowance rather than a minimum requirement. This means you can obtain your permit and reside here seasonally, enjoying the city for three or six months at a time while moving between countries as you please.

The following table provides a comparison of the two main application paths:

3.3. Legal Identity, Domicile Registration and Digital Certificate

THE FOREIGNER IDENTITY NUMBER, OR NIE

The Foreigner Identity Number, commonly known as the NIE, is your essential tax identifier in Spain, and is required for opening bank accounts or signing long term rental contracts. There are several ways to obtain this document. If you have not yet travelled, the most efficient way is to request it through the Spanish consulate in your home country before leaving for Granada.

For those already in Spanish territory, appointments can be reserved through the [Public Administration Electronic Portal](#) to manage the process at the Immigration Office, or at participating National Police Stations. Due to the significant international appeal of our province, demand for appointments in the capital is typically very high.

To facilitate this process, some international professionals choose to hire the services of local administrative agents (gestores) and professional firms. For a fee, they can handle booking the appointment, preparing the relevant paperwork, and providing assistance throughout the entire process.



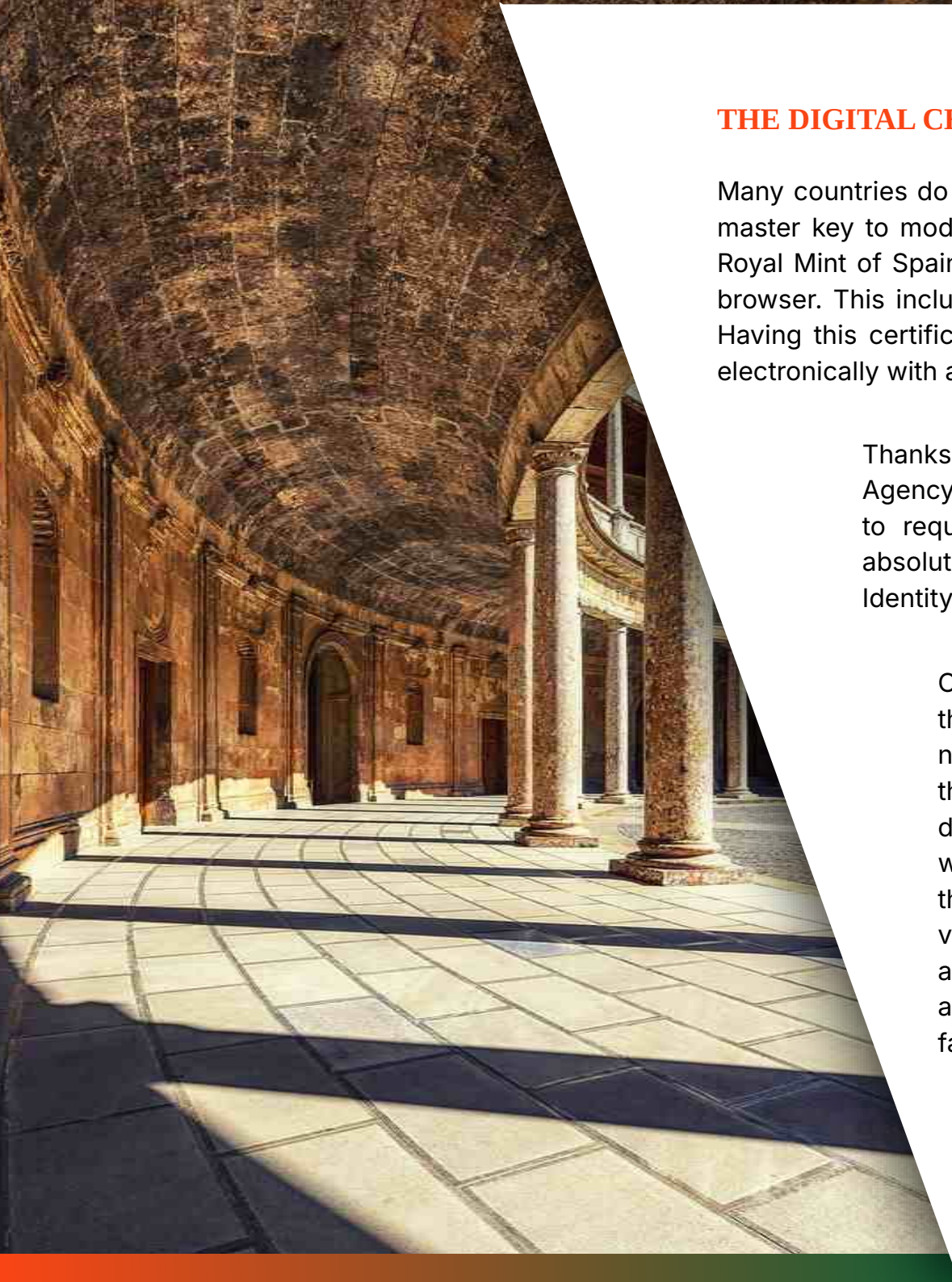


MUNICIPAL DOMICILE REGISTRATION

Often referred to as the “empadronamiento”, this is the official administrative record of your residence in the city. Registering is a vital step for any newcomer, as it serves as the key that unlocks essential local services.

You will need a printed copy of this certificate to enroll at your local health center and to finalize important legal steps, such as obtaining your digital certificate.

To register, simply book an appointment through the [Granada City Council Appointment Portal](#) and bring your passport along with your original rental contract.



THE DIGITAL CERTIFICATE

Many countries do not use this system, but, in Spain, the digital certificate is the master key to modern bureaucracy. It consists of a computer file issued by the Royal Mint of Spain that you can install on any electronic device that has a web browser. This includes mobile phones, desktop computers, laptops, and tablets. Having this certificate allows you to legally identify yourself online and interact electronically with all public administrations.

Thanks to this technology you will be able to register with the Tax Agency or Social Security directly from anywhere, avoiding the need to request in-person appointments. To obtain it though, it is an absolutely essential requirement to already have your Foreigner Identity Number assigned.

Once you have this, you can request an accreditation code on the website of the [Royal Mint of Spain](#) using your identity number and a valid email address. To complete the process there are currently various verification methods at your disposal. You can opt for the [online video identification system](#) without the need for physical travel. If you prefer to complete the procedure in person, there are various options. You can verify your identity not only at the City Council offices, but across an extensive network of state and regional public administration offices throughout the province, greatly facilitating getting a quick appointment.



3.4. Special Taxation Regime for Non-EU Citizens

Relocating to Granada allows you to take advantage of the highly competitive tax environment provided by the Special Regime for Displaced Workers, which is often called the Beckham Law. This system enables eligible professionals to pay a flat tax rate of 24 percent on employment income up to 600,000 euros. This provides a substantial saving compared to the standard progressive income tax that can rise above 47 percent.

To be eligible for this regime you must not have held tax residency in Spain during the five years before your arrival. Furthermore you must file your application with the Tax Agency within six months of your registration with the Spanish Social Security system.

Below we detail the tax differences in a summary table for greater clarity:

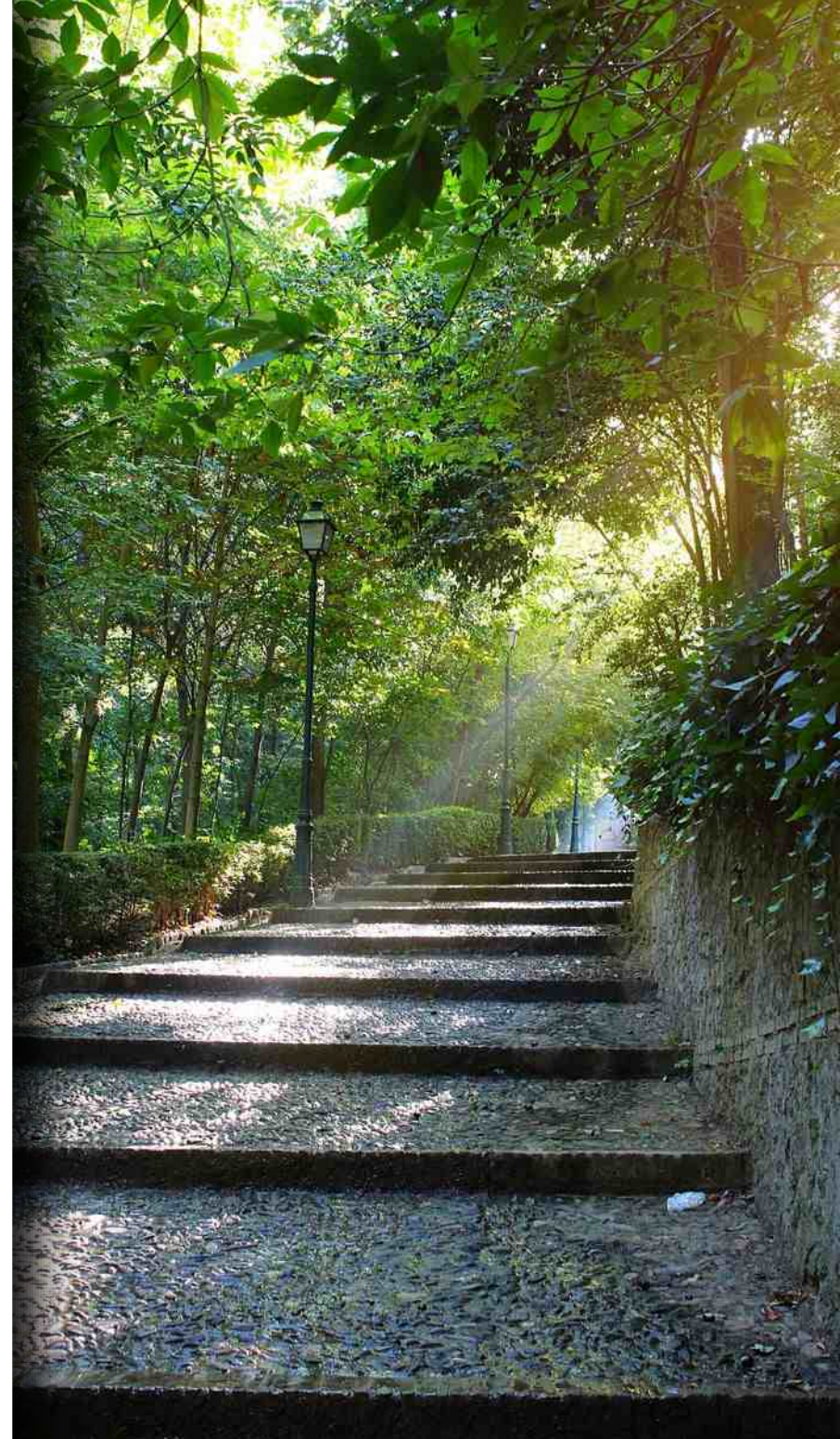

3.5. Health System

Granada provides a world class healthcare ecosystem that consistently exceeds international standards. Within the public health system, residents use advanced digital tools to book appointments through a mobile app, access medical records online, and have phone consultations with specialists.

The city features excellent clinics and major hospital infrastructures, including the pioneering university hospital at the Health Technology Park. This network is further strengthened by its close ties to the University of Granada and its top health science faculties.

On the street, a wide network of pharmacies ensures twenty four hour service through a rotating shift system. Since medication prices are state regulated, they are very affordable. This provides great peace of mind for international professionals who may be used to higher costs or less coverage in their home countries.



EU CITIZENS

Citizens from the European Union have access to public healthcare through the European Health Insurance Card during their first few months.

Once you are officially registered in the city, you can apply for a local health card from the Andalusian Health Service to enjoy full medical coverage across our entire network of clinics and public hospitals.

NON-EU CITIZENS & PRIVATE HEALTHCARE

The Large Companies Unit oversees the visa application process and requires non EU applicants to maintain comprehensive private medical insurance.

This policy must be issued by a provider authorised to operate in Spain and offer full coverage without copayments or waiting periods.

Fortunately, Granada is home to an extensive private healthcare network with specialised clinics and modern hospitals that guarantee prompt and excellent care.



4. Pitfalls to Avoid

4.1. The Non-Lucrative Visa Trap

Many international professionals are unfortunately misinformed and apply for a Non Lucrative Visa under the wrong assumption that they can telework. This is an error, as this specific permit strictly prohibits any kind of economic or professional activity whether it is performed in person or remotely.

Entering the country under this status essentially blocks your progress because the law requires you to remain in Spain for a full year before you are even eligible to request a work permit. In many cases, this bureaucratic hurdle lasts even longer.

If you do not have a formal job offer from a Spanish company or an approved business plan at the precise moment that first year ends you will be forced to renew your initial visa for an additional two years to remain in the country legally.

Although you can eventually request a work permit during that renewal period once the first year is over, the risk of a long term administrative block is significant.

We recommend choosing the Digital Nomad Visa from the very start, to guarantee your legal security and avoid any frustrating delays.



You can see a clear comparison of these cases in the table below:

Visa Type	Teleworking Permission	Legal Consequence
Non Lucrative Visa	Totally prohibited	Minimum one year block in Spain
Digital Nomad Visa	Fully authorised	Legal residence and work guaranteed



4.2. Delays and the 183 Day Cut-off

Spanish tax legislation establishes that if you reside more than 183 days in Spanish territory during a calendar year, you automatically acquire standard tax resident status for that entire year.

If the processing of your visa is delayed due to missing documents and you cross this time barrier residing in the country before formalising your status the Tax Agency will deny you access to the flat rate of the Beckham Law.



4.3. Sustainable Housing and Market Reality

Securing accommodation is one of the most critical and delicate steps for your relocation. It is important to recognise that requirements from landlords can vary significantly. While many European citizens can find rentals with ease, other professionals are often surprised by requests for non-payment insurance. Since you likely lack a payroll from a Spanish company, local insurers typically cannot verify your financial standing through their usual methods. This often results in landlords asking for six to twelve months of rent in advance as a security measure.

In general, we advise against signing any documents in a language you are not proficient in, or accepting conditions without a clear understanding of your legal rights. While many professionals turn to short term tourist rentals when they cannot find other options, we encourage you to consider the broader impact on the residential balance of our city. Granada is committed to maintaining a sustainable housing market that prevents excessive price increases and protects the quality of life for every resident.

A practical and legally sound alternative for remote workers is a 'seasonal rental contract based on professional needs.' This kind of contract provides both flexibility and security without contributing to real estate speculation. Choosing medium or long term rental models helps preserve the character of our city, and ensures a more meaningful integration into the local community while you build up a financial history in Spain.





5. Frequently Asked Questions

Can I work remotely from Granada on a tourist visa?

Legally, no, if you are from outside the EU. Tourist visas and the 90-day Schengen visa waiver are designed exclusively for leisure and short business trips. They do not authorise you to carry out continuous remote work. For that, you must apply for the Digital Nomad Visa.

What if I am an EU citizen and just want to work remotely in Granada for a few months?

You are in the perfect position for a 'workation.' As an EU or EEA citizen staying for less than 90 days, you have no legal obligation to register, obtain a NIE, or pay taxes in Spain, as you will not exceed the 183-day threshold for tax residency. You can simply arrive and work with total freedom while keeping your tax obligations in your home country.





How long does it take to get a Digital Nomad Visa?

If you apply online from within Spain via the Large Companies Unit (UGE), the government is legally required to fast-track your application within 20 business days. If you apply through a Spanish consulate in your home country, processing times will vary depending on their current workload.

Is it safe to drink the tap water in Granada?

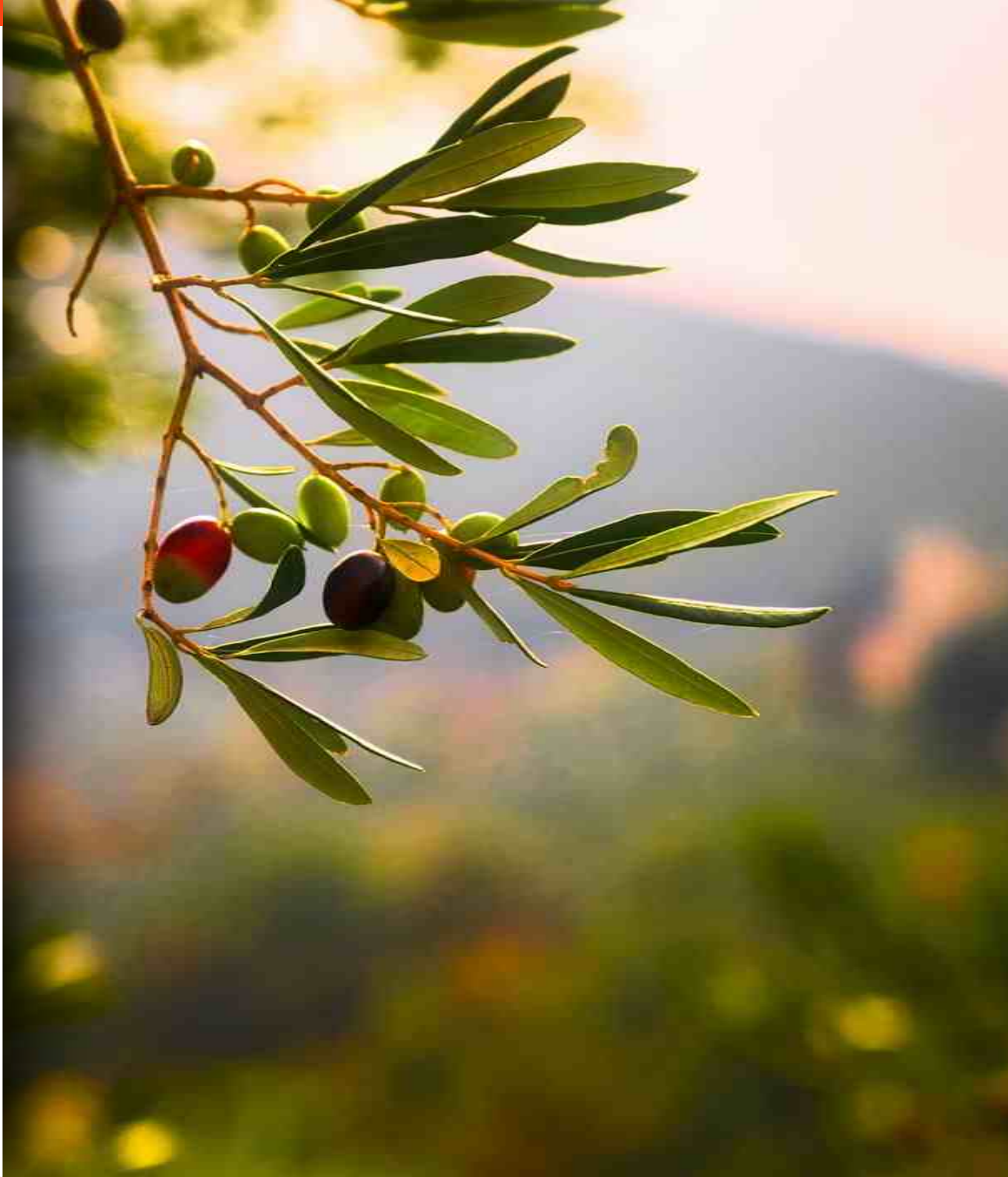
Absolutely. Granada's public water supply is strictly regulated and comes directly from the aquifers and snowmelt of the Sierra Nevada mountains. It is excellent quality, and is consistently ranked among the best drinking waters in Spain.

Can I bring my family with me on a Digital Nomad Visa?

Yes. Spanish law allows for simultaneous family reunification. You can include your spouse, registered domestic partner, and dependent children in your visa application, provided you can demonstrate the additional financial resources required to support them.

What is a Digital Certificate, and why do I need one?

The Digital Certificate acts as your official electronic signature in Spain. Without it, you will be forced to book in-person appointments for every administrative task, which may not be available for while. Once installed on your device, the certificate allows you to register with the tax agency, sign official documents, and handle your registrations online in a matter of minutes.





Do I need to speak Spanish to live in Granada?

Many professionals wonder if the language will be an insurmountable barrier. Although the use of English is common in university and technological environments Granada remains a city with a very strong local identity where learning basic notions of Spanish will greatly facilitate your integration and enrich your daily social experience.

The city has a wide offer of specialised centres for language learning. You can find great private academies and language schools spread across many neighbourhoods.

Furthermore, the [University of Granada's Modern Languages Centre](#) offers high quality intensive programs specifically designed for international residents seeking deep linguistic immersion. This educational institution operates autonomously, and its courses are fully open to private individuals, remote professionals, and digital nomads, without the need to be previously enrolled in a university degree.

Do I need a car to get around the city?

Not at all. Granada is built on a human scale, and has an excellent public transport network. The metro and urban buses connect all the main neighborhoods quickly and efficiently, the historic city centre is extremely walkable, making a car largely unnecessary for day-to-day life.

Is Granada safe to walk around at night?

Yes, safety is one of Granada's biggest draws. It is a highly secure city to walk in, whether during the day or late at night. The vast majority of its residential and historic districts maintain a calm, welcoming, and safe atmosphere.
